## **CHURCH SECRETARY'S REPORT**

Entering 2015 saw the church still in vacancy although the Profile had been prepared and submitted to the Moderator but still giving us much to consider. It was therefore with surprise and pleasure that we received a response in February. There followed much discussion and planning resulting in the Weekend when Mr Prevett came to 'preach with a view'. and thereafter following the successful outcome of 'THE VOTE' the main consideration was of course preparing for Matthew's Ordination and Induction. The actual Service on 26th September went exceedingly well and we much appreciated the support which was given by so many people.

In addition to the main 11.00 am Sunday Service, our regular 9.30 am communion services on the third Sunday of the month and the 9.30 am weekly Tuesday service continue with their regular groups of supporters. The Tenebrae service on Maundy Thursday and the Carols by Candlelight service on Christmas Eve were continued, both again being well attended and an opportunity to see folk who do not normally attend our other services. Our now regular bi-monthly Messy Church is very well supported and has established itself as a regular part of our pattern of worship as are the other opportunities for worship that are arranged for Lent and Advent.

The beginning of December saw the launch of new bi-monthly re-lite services, which are being held on a Sunday evening and followed by refreshments, which have been introduced by our new minister. The first of these was a service of words, music and reflection around HIV/AIDS, as part of a global series of events marking World AIDS Day. Whilst we must not forget that Matthew has 25% commitment to Synod, and which is currently at Thornaby, we do appreciate all the time and effort that he is able to give to St. Andrew's, a large part of which is in getting to 'know us' and likewise us getting to 'know him'.

We continue to appreciate the support given by the Revd Douglas McFarlane, the Revd Gordon Connacher, the Worship Group, Lucy Cooke, Ann Sinclair and Valerie Taylor in leading worship, especially during the vacancy, and all others who take part in services. We were pleased to be able to support Dr Ann Sinclair in her progress towards accreditation as a lay preacher.

At the end of the year there was a membership of 158, with an average Sunday morning congregation of around 90, including children and some regular attenders who are not members. We had no baptisms or weddings in 2015. During the year we mourned the death of several members and friends of long-standing. In November, five Elders who came to the end of their term of office as serving Elders were re-elected to stand for a further term, with one, Kathleen Hopper standing down, her years of service being much appreciated by the church. We were able to welcome Joan Blanchfield and Margaret Varley to the Eldership and wish them every blessing in their future service with St. Andrew's. We have continued to keep in touch, by our system of Link Elders, with the increasing number of organisations meeting on the premises.

Some of our members are involved in the wider church at Northern Synod where Sue Ames is a member of the Children and Youth Work Group, Derek Stembridge is a Trustee of the URC (Northern Province) Trust Limited and serves on a number of its sub groups and Lucy Cooke is involved with work relating to Safeguarding.

The children and young people of Junior Church continue to contribute to morning worship and help to take up the collection. It has however been good to see the change that Matthew has introduced by way of involving the young people in church services on the third Sunday of the month. It has also been good to see that the contact he has made, in the early days, with the uniformed organisations greatly improved attendance at the Harvest and Remembrance Parade Services. We again ran a week-long happy and relaxed Holiday Club at the church. St Andrew's Parent and Toddler Group continues to meet.

St. Andrew's is very much a community church with a wide variety of different organisations using the premises and to this end the Elders support Lucy Cooke in her role of Community Elder. Users include a large number of sessions where children and young people are involved including the uniformed organisations, the Saturday Stage School and the linked Tuesday Drama Club and several classes, of various types, for babies and toddlers. Although most are very peripheral to our church life, the introduction of Messy Church has enabled some positive connections to be made. We do try to live out our recognised status as a Child Friendly Church which we were pleased to have renewed. We were pleased to continue, and build, on our links with Langley First School, the school holding their annual carol service in the church and some of our members, and our minister, visiting the school, from time to time, in connection with school assemblies.

We supported Christian Aid in the annual door-to-door collection, albeit for the last time as it is felt that door to door collections are becoming more difficult especially with fewer people prepared to undertake them, but funds will be raised in another way. We do continue our support for Christian Aid through the URC Commitment for Life programme. Over Christmas we collected for the Christian Aid Nigerian Malaria Project which attracted match funding from the Government. We were pleased that we were able to maintain some charitable work full details of which can be seen in the Treasurer's Report. We also were pleased to continue the Charity Scheme whereby 10% of fund-raising was collected to be given to three charities selected by church members. The church also acts as a channel for other charitable donations when retiring offerings are sought at funeral services held in the church.

The joint meetings with St Columba's as the two churches in the Coast Partnership continued.

Our involvement in Whitley Bay & District Churches Together has continued. We have continued to support the Street Pastors Project, the Bay Food Bank and the Depaul Trust. Our friendly co-operation with the other five churches in the parishes of St Peter's and St Alban's has continued with the usual social events. The special close relationship with St. Peter's continued with joint Lent services and devotions.

We continue to be grateful to our organists for their major contribution to our acts of worship: Paul Hartley, Joy Campbell, Helen Storey and Maurice Wilson-Voke. We are continually grateful to the Music Group for their contribution from time to time to the worship life of the church.

In general a year of much enthusiasm for the future but not without its sadness, the decision by the Wednesday Fellowship (in the earlier days as the Ladies Guild) to close brings to an end a group that was a major part of church life from the very beginning,

Of necessity this has been a brief look at the life and witness of St. Andrew's and some of which is expanded on in the other reports that follow all of which are part of the worshipping, community and social life of St. Andrew's Church.

## **EXECUTIVE TEAM REPORT**

The Team oversees the day to day work of the Church Teams: Finance, Premises Maintenance, Development, and Activities, as well as overseeing hall lettings.

We continue to enjoy the benefit of the refurbished premises although after the length of time since the work was undertaken some more major redecoration has been necessary to keep the premises looking smart and at times some repairs are now necessary.

**Premises Maintenance Team** - oversees the general cleaning of the premises and monitors the cleaning which is carried out by N&P Cleaners. Whilst the thrice weekly clean does not always coincide with the use of the premises, the 52 week cover is well worth any slight inconvenience. Once again cleaning of the carpets and chairs was carried out during the school holidays.

Regular cleaning of the outside of the main entrance windows continues to be undertaken on a monthly basis by a contractor with all other windows being cleaned around the time of the annual Work Day. This year they again cleaned the inside of the windows in the reception area. The annual Work Day is a very sociable occasion when general cleaning, which the cleaning company does not carry out, is undertaken. The team of gardeners continues to maintain the gardens to an attractive and high standard.

**Activities Team** – The Team continues to take on the social and fund-raising activities for the church. A variety of events, ranging from 100 Club, Craft Fair, Film Club, Games Evening to Carol Singing were again held during the year all of which have been well supported and enjoyed by those attending.

The Church Fair was once again a highlight of the year with a substantial amount being raised, the match funding from Barclays for the Tombola continuing to be an extremely useful contribution to the takings on the day.

The selection of charities was well supported by church members and the Team was pleased to present cheques to the selected charities and we look forward to presenting more cheques in 2016 as well as asking members to choose charities to receive donations in 2017.

**Hall Lettings** – The premises continue to be very well used by both church organisations, local community groups, as well as other activities. The list of users grows ever longer. All users are very appreciative of the facilities offered.

### **General**

Overseeing the running of premises the size of our church buildings with the heavy usage that takes place, as well as organising all the routine servicing of appliances and equipment, is a time-consuming job and requires much time and effort by a small dedicated group of people to whom we are very grateful.

**The Beech Grove Manse** – During the year the tenancy came to an end and the necessary redecoration and repairs were undertaken to enable the property to be occupied by our new Minister.

### **TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 2015 AND BUDGET FOR 2016**

Overall, the Church's assets increased by over £60,000 during 2015. On the face of it this looks like good news. However, there are some worrying trends with The General Fund showing a deficit of almost £11,000. The increase in assets was due to generous legacies totalling £81,000 which, as agreed at previous Church Meetings, were credited to the Development Fund. And we are budgeting another large deficit for 2016.

Highlights of 2015 income and expenditure are summarised as follows:

- After the increase in 2014 offerings and donations resumed their downward trend, being 5% lower than 2014.
- The Activities team once again exceeded their budget, with a total of over £13,600 raised for Church funds and local charities.
- Hall Letting income declined slightly. We expect this will pick up again with the increased prices for 2016.
- As predicted we had a respite in M&M and Synod levies increases; however further increases are expected in 2016 and in future years.
- We gratefully received legacies of £76,000 and £5,000 from the estates of the late Martha MacDonald and Joy Adamson respectively.
- Our Utilities bill was again lower than last year, thanks to another mild winter.
- Altogether, from funds raised at activities, funeral collections and special collections, we donated nearly £3,500 to various charities during the year. This is lower than in 2014.
- The Manse Fund has a deficit of over £5,000. The income from the tenants more than covered the on-going running costs of the Manse, but not the major refurbishment work. The deficit has since been made up via a transfer of funds from the Development Fund.
- At the end of the year the General Fund stood at £16,711. An injection of cash from the Development Fund was made in January to raise it to the safety level of £20,000.

### **Budget 2016**

The budget proposal for 2016 is based on our income and expenditure for 2015 and again shows a substantial deficit, even after budgeting for a transfer of interest from the Project Fund investments. With this anticipated income and expenditure, the General Fund would stand at £8,000 next December, which means another substantial transfer of money from the Development Fund would be needed. We usually do better than budget (2015 being an exception) and I hope this is the case again this year.

It has been a privilege to serve as your Treasurer for the past ten years. I am pleased to be leaving the post with the Church's finances in good order, but I do caution that if

we continue to run large deficits on the General Fund our reserves will run dry sooner rather than later. Please remember to keep up your generous donations.

In leaving I would like to personally thank everyone for all the help that has been extended to me from the Finance Team leaders and members, all those on the collector's rota, and particularly to Jenny Hooper for her work as Assistant Treasurer. I could not have done this without you all. I wish Kevin Ames lots of luck as my successor.

### **DEVELOPMENT TEAM**

During 2015 the emphasis on carrying out minor items of work continued, beginning with the provision of sound-proofing measures between the hall, stage and minor hall. These took the form of soundproofing curtains to the west stage door and a new ceiling to the rear half of the stage. The opportunity was also taken to install a sound-proofing curtain to the corridor between the church vestibule and the main reception servery area.

An additional TV monitor connected into the existing screen network within the church has been installed such that it may be seen by those leading worship from the chancel area.

Future proposed works for 2016 will include the renewal of external protection for the St Andrew's stained glass window in the south gable of the church and the replacement of three pairs of internal double doors to the church worship area.

I offer my thanks to members of the Development Team for their continuing help and support.
