

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Dear friends,

With the arrival of Easter, we can begin – finally – to see the start of spring. There have been many of our fellowship who have struggled in the long winter, and it has been particularly difficult with the weather through February and March – especially with all that the 'Beast from the East' has brought.

The season of Easter gives us the opportunity to think about New Life – about the way that the cold and dark of winter can be transformed into a season of gradual warmth, longer days and brighter gardens. The arrival of the daffodils and the crocuses during the past few days and weeks has shown that the barren and colourless ground can bring forth something bright and cheerful.

The season of Lent can be one of challenge and questioning, and it can leave us with many things to consider. It can be a period of deep and profound examination of who we are, how we respond to God's call upon our lives, and what opportunities God is laying before us to seize and to savour. It's a season to spend in prayer – as some of us have in our Lent Groups – and to seek to hear God's voice to us as devoted followers.

Although Easter brings an end to the season of Lent, in many ways the challenges of listening to God and to God's way for us become more acute. The New Life that we celebrate at Easter comes from the empty tomb – from where the dead body of Jesus was laid. The encounter of

We can only see the New Life that we celebrate at Easter because of the challenging story of death and crucifixion. Without them, the Resurrection has no story to tell.


In our lives as a Church and as Christians, we are often quick to deny the challenges and the difficulties – perhaps even to ignore the decline and death that we find around us. But the Easter story – God's Good News – is that the pain of Good Friday is transformed into the unexpected of Easter morning, where the Risen Christ meets with disciples and strangers and shares the news of God's transforming love.

Perhaps as we move into this Easter season, our response as faithful disciples is not to deny but is to recognise the challenges around us, and look and listen for how God is transforming and giving us hope in our lives. For the disciples, it was the shock of the crucifixion that led them to be fearful and afraid, and to be brought face-to-face with the catastrophic end of Jesus's life. God met them in their grief and in their sorrow and showed them that love is stronger than hate.

As we enter the Easter season, may we be able to hear God's Good News amid the challenges of our lives and in the difficulties that face us as a congregation, and may we know Christ's peace among us.

Hadrian's Wall Path to Local History

A number of us were expecting the usual talk about the origins of Hadrian's Wall on 5th March

but no, this was not in any way like that.

Instead, it was the tale of four friends walking along the wall in "bite sized" stages and of the history of the interesting bits, live music and poems about the particular areas they passed through, along with pictures projected onto the big screen.

However we did note that their route seemed to navigate to the best tea shops, cafés and restaurants en route.

Here is a brief overview:-

They started for Segedunum (ye naa, in Wallsend) and gave fascinating stories as they passed through Newcastle and Newburn. Not many of us knew that Newburn had been a Royal Borough and the high spot of the Newcastle area. They told us about Harry Clasper, one of the many rowing competitors from Newburn, who went on to become a world champion.

A poem described "The Trooth Aboot the Waall" by Ripyard Cuddling and the songs were largely well known Geordie songs. Waters of Tyne was beautifully played as a flute solo.

We learnt about why the Military Road was built and that Winshields Crag is the highest point of the wall.

Their journey progressed via Cawfields Quarry, Thirlwall Castle and Gilsland, then via Willowford Bridge, Banks Turret, Walton, Rickerby and followed the River Eden into Carlisle, a city which came into being long before Newcastle. We noted that by this stage our intrepid travellers were visiting hostelries and cafés with much greater frequency.

After describing the failed attempt to build a canal between the Solway Firth and the Tyne — in fact it only got as far as Carlisle from the Solway and then fell into disuse — the final part of their walk was from Carlisle to the Solway via Glasson, Port Carlisle and Bowness on Solway — effectively the other "Wallsend".

They then finished with the poem "Walk on the Wildside".

A wonderful presentation of history, story, music and poetry which completed this season for 2017 and 2018.
