

As June comes around we get to the end of the rapid succession of Christian festivals and seasons that fill the first half of the liturgical year that begins at the start of Advent. The Christian Calendar tends to refer to the rest of the year – through to the start of Advent – with the rather unexciting term "Ordinary time". It reminds us that so many of the festivals we mark celebrate extra-ordinary events.

As Ordinary time progresses a number of common factors occur. During this time, the Lectionary takes us through some of the less popular parts of the bible, often gifting us with some rather unusual stories and some rather challenging passages. Some Sundays appear to be rather 'ordinary' in their content – leaving us with a lack of interesting peaks in the stories we hear and the topics we encounter.

But however ordinary the season may seem, we need to remember that we are given the opportunity for the extraordinary. Every Sunday is a 'Little Easter' – with us being reminded constantly of the power of God – while every day is an opportunity for us to live out our calling as followers of Christ.

We spent the Sundays leading up to Pentecost thinking about the purpose and potential we have within ourselves and within our life as a Christian community. When we use the ordinary of our lives – our own gifts and skills, our money, our talents – we can do extraordinary things and be the extraordinary presence of God in the world.

More of the Bible in a number of numbers

Our potential might need to be realised in becoming active in something – perhaps you would like to be involved in the organisation of our Remembrance and Reconciliation Festival, or to help us with our work with Children and Young People. Perhaps you'll be passionate about some of the 2020 Hopes that we're working towards and want to be part of those.

But maybe the possibility of being actively involved isn't something you can do now. With that in mind, perhaps your purpose and potential as a follower of Jesus in this place now is to be vocal and supportive of the things that we do as a Church, to feed into our discussions and to show encouragement to the things that we ought to do. Maybe you can be supportive of letting others try new things, or maybe it's time to give the Church permission to step out into new ways of relating with the world. Perhaps your way of living the potential of the extraordinary is to let others be encouraged to step out in new ways and with changed priorities. Maybe it's an opportunity to write a card or a letter to your minister or elder to thank or encourage them in the ministry they do in the name of the Church.

As the season of 'Ordinary time' begins, we all have the opportunity to live out our extraordinary potential as followers of Jesus. How will you make this season extraordinary?

One of the areas of my ministry that never ceases is that of ministry at times of bereavement. Over the past 18 months, we have said goodbye to a number of friends close to this fellowship as they have left this life and been welcomed into God's eternal presence. It is a tough time for families and I know that there is a great appreciation for the support they get from the Church in their grief, both in the lead up to the funeral and afterwards.

The process of planning a funeral can be a challenging one for family members. Many have never needed to make funeral arrangements before. While no one likes to 'plan' these things ahead (although a few of you have told me that you have!), a little bit of preparation can make this less challenging. From my experience there are two main areas that could be usefully thought about beforehand to help family (and Church/Minister) in making arrangements.

First, there tends to be a vastly different attitude and service provided by different Funeral Directors. In my experience, family companies (usually where the name of the company is the name of the Director) often provide a service that is focused on the family and they appreciate the experience and input of the Church or Minister. Bigger

firms often give better prices, but don't always have the time (or inclination) to 'go the extra mile' or to work constructively with the Church or Minister.

Second, while leaving wishes that are too lengthy or too detailed can be overly restricting it can make it easier on the family and minister if there are some indications of what might be included in the service(s). Not everything can be used all the time, but it can be helpful for family and minister if there are some suggestions. I'm happy to be involved in a conversation about this with individuals or families and can help to record useful suggestions that can be available for whenever the time arrives.

This can be a difficult topic to address, but there really is some comfort for all concerned to know that there has been some thought ahead of time. Do not hesitate to be in touch if you would like a conversation.
