Dear friends,

It's been quite a year for sport. Whether you follow any particular sport or whether you tend to give it a wide berth, it's undeniable that there has been lots of sport going on this year. From the winter Olympics in South Korea, Wimbledon and the football World Cup, international sport has been kept high in the news. At this international level, we see people who are competing at the top of their sport, pushing the boundaries of what they've done before, with new competitors appearing on the scene, while others fade away as their time has been and gone.

It's clear that to excel a great deal of effort and energy needs to be put in. Research into the latest ideas for training needs to take place. Hours of disciplined practice are essential to hone the skills and improve the technique. A good diet and general exercise are required to ensure that the athletes are kept in good health and able to operate at peak performance.

To be part of a team that succeeds, effort needs to be put in by all. Everyone in a team needs to put in the effort to develop as a team, coached and trained to use the gifts of each other, to support one another, to build one another up, and to seek always to strengthen a position as they seek to be the best they can be. Strong teams find themselves a coach who will lead them in a direction they need to go, and will work with them and other

leaders to ensure that they can learn, develop and grow in the ways they need to go. That old, slightly tacky management mantra rings true: there's no 'I' in 'Team'.

But other athletes and teams don't manage to have this co-operation and rather than being a team, utilising the coaching staff available, do their own thing, being a collection of individuals with their own interests and specialisms, but with little or no intention to sharing in a common endeavour. Failure of the team or athlete is attributed to their individual ego or personal preferences, or poor leadership. The teams that serve double faults, score own goals, or have a shambolic defensive provision can never truly be a team that will succeed without developing and growing in new ways.

Good and strong teams work together, utilise the resources available to them, put in the effort to develop together, learning together and honing the skills and knowledge that will make them stand out and succeed. It's never easy to be successful, but to do so requires cooperation and openness to grow together, and in doing so, becoming a team that can face the challenges that stand before them – on the field, in the boardroom, or in the media.

The following was delivered in Sunday Worship at General Assembly by the Revd John Proctor Sunday 8 July 2018

There are two good ways to resist change in the church. One is the jaded way – to point out: We've done that before. The other is the bemused way: We've never done that before. They work equally well. Either suffices to defuse, deter and divert any thought of innovation.

Familiarity and fear. Fed up with what we've tried, fearful of what we haven't, we stay in our groove until it becomes a grave – a grave for optimism, for hope and for courage.

Perhaps it isn't at all like that where you come from. But there is a bit of that mood around in many a church. And it does have biblical precedence, starting at Nazareth, no less.

I wonder what kind of footprint Jesus left in Nazareth, what memories, impressions or emotions lingered after he set out on the road. We have little to go on, apart from Jesus' occasional visit to his home village, to his sending church we might call it, for example in Mark chapter six.

And that day, as Jesus preached, somebody said to their neighbour, you know I pushed him in his pram. I taught him in primary school. He kicked a football through my kitchen window. He used to keep an eye on my sheep. Who does he think he is? Important? Not likely. He's just a local boy.

'He was amazed at their unbelief.' Familiarity. This is Nazareth. We've met that before. We can domesticate that challenge. If there's any novelty in Jesus, people like us have the background, the experience, the savvy, the history, not to take it too seriously. Give me back my groove.

Neil Armstrong was the 1st to land on the moon. Neil A backwards is Alien. Is this a coincidence? The other half of the reading might play straight into the second way of resisting change: we've never done that before. He sent the twelve out, two by two. Several chapters earlier Jesus had called them to be with him and to be sent out. So perhaps some of them were tempted to think, Well, we're with him. We've done that bit, quite nicely. Do you think 50% is a pass mark? But now he sent them out, to make inroads of wholeness and hope into the realm of suffering and evil. They would not carry much with them. Sufficiency was ahead, not on board. And although fear is unstated in the text, I think I can smell it between the lines. Can we cope? Will it be difficult? We've never done that before.

Home and away. The domestic, the familiar, the known, the groove – a groove so deep that we stop seeing over the top of it, to God's horizon. Or a way, a road, a journey, into something new – a journey that frightens, but a journey that actually offers much more by way of hope.

Nazareth is a safe place. Jesus had to spend some time there. And so do we. But the way usually seems to lead outwards. There is work to do. There may be changes to embrace. We shall find ways of resisting it if we really want to. But when Jesus sends us, the best thing to do is to travel, in expectancy and confidence and hope. And it's to help each other to do that, and to help thousands of people in our churches to want to do that – that's why we come together at General Assembly.

Thanks be to God.

June has been an unusual month for our finances. The income from hall lettings was greatly reduced to £905, mostly due to our regular users having paid up to date in the previous month. Couple with this, a gas bill of £1,821 would have eaten into our surplus from May. However, on the plus side, the investment interest of £2,355 from the Development Fund was paid into the General Fund, and we received a donation of £500 from the Scottish Country Dancing group. Also another £207 was raised from the last days of Granny's Attic, and £593 from the Northumbrian Evening.

In other funds, so far small amounts have been spent on the RARF project, and on our Commitment for Life, I was able to send off another £1,000 to their funds.

These can be pictures, photos, sculptures or poetry. The only rule is that the work must be original to you.






Your subject can be anything linked to the theme "Remembrance & Reconciliation" so why not get your paints, pencils, cameras and clay out and see what you can create?


