

I write this letter almost exactly four years to the day since I first visited St Andrew's for conversation with the vacancy committee. Those four years have been full of experiences and opportunities. I have shared in tears and laughter, in praying and knitting, in saying farewell to loved ones and walking alongside others. It has been an experience rich with encounters and deeply profound opportunities for sharing the love of God.

But there have been reasons that I need now to leave. These I announced on the 2nd December and published at the request of the Editor in the January Newstand, with these complemented in the extended letter sent on 2nd December to the Moderator and Elders, via the Church Secretary. I will not rehearse those reasons here. However, I will thank the many of you who have said to me how much you recognise my reasons and have offered your support and your regret in my decision. Amid shock, surprise and

disbelief, I have been encouraged in the continued and continuing experiences I have had with members of the fellowship and local community where I have felt love, support and blessing.

One of the 'pleasures' of packing up a house is that you have opportunity to do a 'clear out' – deciding what items need to be kept, and what needs to be thrown out (or sent elsewhere for recycling). I've used a fairly ruthless approach this time: "will I EVER use this again?" or "will I EVER read this?" or "do I need these duplicates?". In this case, we're bringing two homes together too – we don't need two fridge-freezers, or the eight sofas (yes, eight!) we have between us, or the sad looking shelf

unit when we've already got a good, sturdy one. But you also need to have an idea about what the future might be – what is the plan for future living, what might be needed for a future lifestyle or home.

A vacancy is a similar opportunity for a Church: what do we need to be to be a Church going forward? What do we think is important about our life to keep hold of? What might we be best disposing of (or sending to be recycled somewhere else) so we are not overburdened on our vacancy journey? The clear out, the discussion about future use, the setting up for the immediate and for the future is an important part of what a vacancy can offer a Church. But it's not without effort and work – a clear-out takes time and energy, and it needs the forethought to plan and think about what the next steps might be. For the sake of St Andrew's, I truly hope the energy and effort can be found in the wider fellowship, using the opportunity of hearing everyone's voice and contribution, to work on what this might be and how the future may look.

So as the 3rd March comes around and I lead my last service as the Minister of St Andrew's, I want to offer you my thanks and best wishes for all that the future holds. Both Gary and I are appreciative of the love and support you have expressed to us, especially over the past three months but over much of the past three years.

May God bless you all on your journey with Christ, that the gospel may be lived and God's love shown in Monkseaton and beyond.

You are all welcome, and at the end of the short service we will retire to Monkseaton Methodist for refreshments.


EASTER SUNDAY SUNRISE SERVICE

Admiral Nurses with Sue Ogden

Sue is an Admiral Nurse Volunteer Ambassador. She is passionate about the work she does for them, promoting Admiral Nurses, giving talks and fund raising.

Dementia UK provides support for people with dementia and their families. There are 8,500 people known to be living with Dementia. This number is expected to rise to one million by 2025 and two million by 2050. There is currently no cure. There are over two hundred types of Dementia, all different, complex and requiring special support - Alzheimer's being one of them.

Admiral Nurses were founded by the family of Joseph Levey who had vascular Dementia, to provide 1:1 support, professional guidance and help with personal challenges. The goal is that they will be available all over the UK. There are now 260. 18,000 families accessed the Helpline last year. The first Admiral Nurse to be appointed in our area is Rachel, in 2016, who is based at the Bradbury Centre, North Shields. There are now three more Admiral Nurses in this area. Dementia UK does not fund Admiral Nurses. They are a charitable trust relying on donations and fund raising.

Peter, Sue's husband was diagnosed with Dementia, when he was sixty six, which was a terrible blow. Daily life became more and more challenging. Sue attended courses to gain information. She found that other people living with Dementia, were a valuable source of information and support. Rachel, the Admiral Nurse in our area came to talk to Peter, visited frequently and gained his trust. She also supported Sue. Peter is now in a Care Home in North Shields and Sue has become a Volunteer Ambassador for Admiral Nurses which involved a great deal of initial training.

Nightstop with Jasmine, Paula and Dimaz

Nightstop North East is a charity that offers emergency, overnight accommodation for young people over 16 years old, who are at risk of homelessness or experiencing homelessness and have nowhere else to stay.

Nightstop guests are placed in the homes of trained and vetted volunteer hosts who provide a safe and secure place for the guests to stay that evening. The hosts provide a private bedroom, a listening ear, breakfast, washing facilities and a hot meal in the evening.


Depaul UK coordinates the Nightstop Network and runs a number of Nightstop services across the country. Their mission is to end homelessness and change the lives of people affected by it.

Would you like to be a Steward? The Apostles' Creed is a simple statement of Christian belief that had its genesis from the Early Church around the first and second centuries.

The United Reformed Church upholds the Creed, amongst others, in its confessions of faith. While other

denominations recite the Creed as part of their Sunday worship, the URC tend only to recite the Creed at baptismal services or, as in the past at St Andrew's Monkseaton, as a declaration on becoming a formal member of the URC.

The idea of reciting a creed either individually or in collective worship does not sit well with everyone in the modern world. In a society of 'getting out there and doing something' there could be arguments against the formality of reciting Creeds, and instead that Christians should focus on addressing injustices and take out the Word of God for the Glory of His Kingdom. Christians do, yet there is a place for The Apostles' Creed. The Creed affirms our faith and challenges us to think of our knowledge of Scripture and therefore our knowledge of God. The Apostles' Creed grounds us in Christian history, reinforces our present faith and gives hope for the future.

We find that challenge and reassurance in the Apostles' Creed that is reinforced in the words of the hymn: 'At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow, every tongue confess him, King of Glory now; tis the Father's pleasure we should call him Lord, who from the beginning was the mighty Word...He is God the Saviour, he is Christ the Lord, ever to be worshipped, trusted and adored'.


