Over the last few months St Andrew's Church Monkseaton has lost several well-loved members, the sudden impact of their passing shattering the lives of their loved ones and enveloping them in profound grief. The immediate families' great sense of shock and grief has been mirrored by that of St Andrew's church family. The loss of such well-loved members has had a deep effect on so many of the members. This has demonstrated the extent of the love, friendship and good deeds of these well-loved folks, be it carried out quietly or in the sheer practical presence of their hands-on support, love and friendship. Their Christian faith is quite simply Christian love in action. At this point in time life will never be the same for their immediate families or the family of St Andrew's.

Any experience of trauma becomes part of the very essence of those left behind coping with their loss either suddenly or expectedly and extends over a range of emotions and on different levels: sadness and grief, shock and disbelief, anger and guilt. Each individual handles these emotions of grief in different ways. Outwardly showing and sharing grief with others, giving voice to their sadness and pain is one channel. Yet for others, or at different times in grieving, that sorrow, heartache and sadness of their loss is kept for solitary times in finding quiet space to grieve. There is no right or wrong way.

In times of loss God's people have drawn strength from Scripture and prayers for peace and comfort. In the support and love we have for those families we hold dear, and in the support we give each other within the family of

Lament for an old friend



Today we mourn the passing of a beloved old friend, Common Sense, who has been with us for many years. - **Church Secretary** reported:
- Expression of thanks to all supporting St Andrew's for services including baptisms and funerals and especially the services during Lent and Easter.
- The success, and appreciation of those attending, the monthly afternoon services
- Receipt of Link Elders reports for Brownies, Stage School and Trefoil Guild.
- Report of Langley Year 1 pupils to St Andrew's.
- Change in giving information – from Orders of Service to notices on coffee tables.
- Request for Music Group to be re-established.
- More baptisms and weddings booked.
- Sadness at deaths of member and friends.
- Executive Team proceeding with letting the Manse.

- Activities Team pleased with recent social and fund-raising events especially those for Christian Aid.
- Premises 'less busy' since Fun Little Foodies left for their own premises.
- **Treasurer** reported:
- Finances are looking reasonably good and closely following budget for the year.
- Operating a balanced budget where overspend is funded from interest from the Development Fund.
- 2019 projected deficit of £16,000 to be covered with £13,000 from General Fund and £3,000 from Development Fund interest.
- To end of May deficit £4,327.
- Exploring getting involved with helping the local community by way of investment in a Credit Union. Synod will match investment by up to £5,000.
- Donations from St Andrew's members totalling £1,000 to Commitment for Life Scheme.
