There is nothing quite like a birthday party! Be it for a one year old or a hundred-year-old and all the ages in between. A birthday is something to

celebrate, and if it is a 'special' birthday marking milestones in life, e.g. 18,21,30,40, etc., that adds to the celebrations; they can be bigger than ever! Your birthday is a special day for you, it is your day even though you may share that day with millions of people around the world!

Apart from the birthday person themselves, the birthday cake plays a central part in the celebrations. It may be a simple homemade cake or some extravagantly designed cake suitably decorated to reflect the 'birthday person's' character or a hobby. But then comes another big moment - the lighting of candle or candles. With the flick of a match or lighter the candle wick leaps into life. Think of the look on the faces around the cake as the light begins to shine, all around faces glowing in the candle light, everyone focusing on the light... before the singing starts!

With a flick of a match, friction occurs and a spark leaps from match to tinder. A small flame burns and grows fuelled by wood and air, heat builds and soon the kindling is licked by reddish orange tongues. Higher and wider it spreads, consuming the wood. The flame has become a fire. And so, it did, in another place around two thousand years ago. In Palestine, 50 days after Passover, there was the festival of Pentecost, the Festival of First Harvest, a thanksgiving for the harvested crops. 50 days after the Resurrection, a match was struck in Palestine. Coming like the roaring of a mighty windstorm and with flames and tongues of fire the Holy Spirit

settled on a group of believers, followers of Jesus Christ, on what was to become the emerging Church.

The tongues of fire symbolised speech and the communication of the Good News. And the fire symbolised God's purifying presence burning away the undesirable elements of believers' lives and setting hearts aflame to ignite the lives of others with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

At first, just a few were touched and warmed but the fire spread. Emboldened by the Holy Spirit the band of believers travelled beyond Jerusalem from the shores of Judea to Rome, across the Roman Empire and beyond, to parts of Europe, to Asia and North Africa. This band of believers taught, healed and spread the love of Jesus Christ on streets, hills, ships and desert road, synagogues, schools, homes and marketplaces, wherever God sent them. History was changed at Pentecost. With the kindling of a flame God's presence was and is available to everyone who believes. That Pentecost was the Church's first birthday!

Put yourself in the shoes of those believers touched by the Holy Spirit taking the message out, read Acts again and step out with them on their Holy Spirit-led journeys in those first centuries. Read of the risks, persecution and suffering they faced to take the message of the risen Lord out into the world.

At Pentecost can we flick a match and tend a flame that turns into a fire, and spread that flame of desire for the Word of God in the love of Jesus Christ our Lord? Can we be twenty first century versions of those men and women at that first time of the coming of the Holy Spirit?

At Pentecost, celebrate the Church's birthday...perhaps light a candle and see the flame burn, or hold a picture in your mind of a birthday cake candle lit in celebration of the Good News, the love and grace of God, our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ and the empowerment of the Holy Spirit. As believers think of all the gifts God gives us, indeed how rich we are with all the gifts God gives us each and every day, in fact you could say it is your birthday every day!


Quiz Night!


