

Minister's Musings

Dear Friends,

Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed!

 Λ T e are now in the season of Eastertide, which will last until Pentecost, 31 May this year.

After the resurrection, Christ appears – his wounds visible – to Mary Magdalene (John 20:11-18), the disciples on a mountain (Matthew 27:16) and in a locked room (John 20:19-29), Cleopas and his mate on

the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35), and finally Peter, Thomas, Nathaniel, brothers James and John and two others on the shore of the Sea of Tiberias where they had breakfast (John 21). Each story has its marvel and poignancy; each speaks to

us in this time of quiet reflection. Mary thinks he's the gardener through her veil of tears and tries to cling to him when she realises it is he. The mountain top disciples receive a commission to share the good news the world over. The locked room disciples receive the gift of peace and the knowledge that they have the power to forgive sins. Cleopas and friend meet the risen Christ in the breaking of the bread,

their hearts warmed within them. And on the lakeshore – the place they were first called - Peter heard the call to Feed my sheep; tend my lambs.

The resurrection

appearances tell us that the risen Christ wants to live on in the bodies of those who love and follow him. As we enter our fifth week of lockdown, I reflect on the wonderful ways I have seen and heard Christ's love living on in the bodies of ordinary women and men. In our own congregation, I know of people who are shopping and delivering food for those who are unable. Phone calls are being made, keeping us all connected, and cards are being written. One man, too deaf to be able to hear on a telephone, called his elder who has been faithfully writing cards, and sang to her on the telephone! People are reaching out from their gardens or daily walks or patios to connect with others. Someone is dressing up for Clap for Carers. You may not think much of it as you are doing it, but what you are doing is

> extending Christ's love to others. You are reassuring them: you are not alone; we are in this together.

> You will have your own stories of kindnesses received and witnessed. We are all tickled to bits (actually to tears) that soon


to be 100 year old Captain Tom Moore has raised millions for the NHS by walking laps in his garden. Every Thursday evening at 8pm I am moved (again to tears) as we all stand outside our houses and clap, whistle, whoop, bang and holler for the carers and key workers who every day are putting their lives on the line to keep us safe and healthy. that pour into my email box and roll through Facebook are a healing balm. We need each other, in the flesh, by the phone, through the web. The better angels of our nature have emerged



Cathedral Connections

Many of you know that last August, I started a new job at Newcastle Cathedral as Volunteer Coordinator. I've been working in the field of heritage sector volunteer management for 16 years but this is definitely my dream job-combining profession, vocation and calling. I recently wrote a blog for the Cathedral website explaining why it was

so important to me and I thought I would share it with you all.

I was born and brought up in Newcastle and have spent most of my life in the North East apart from a 4 year stint at University. Some of my fondest childhood memories involve trips into the city centre when my parents would often offer me a choice of something to do aside from shopping! I would inevitably choose to visit either the Joicey Museum (sadly no longer there) or the Cathedral. We were not a reliaious or

church-going family but there was something about the Cathedral that drew me in even at an early age. I was especially fond of the Thornton Brass and remember having hours of fun creating rubbings of brasses and stones around the building. As I grew up, although my visits became fewer in number and I moved further away from any interest in the church or faith, the Cathedral remained as a special place for me and somewhere I would be drawn to if I needed some space to think. I never imagined though that I could end up working in this wonderful place but

almost 40 years after, as a little girl, I stood in awe in front of the large Thornton Brass, which is exactly what has happened!

As a member of staff my route to get here has been slightly different from that of the volunteers I support but I imagine my desire to work here comes from a very similar place. Having developed a sense

> of faith fairly recently there is something in that that motivates me to be here too although I am delighted that faith isn't seen as a prerequisite to being either a volunteer or member of paid staff. Not surprisingly perhaps, the Thornton Brass is no longer my favourite item in the Cathedral now that I have grown up (!) I am now drawn to the Stephen Cox Sculpture, a beautiful piece depicting the broken host of the Eucharist and the ellipse of a tilted chalice, proclaiming the love of God broken for the needs

of the world. It articulates perfectly the draw the Cathedral has on me. There seems to be a certain serendipity in that it sits above the medieval brass that I remember so fondly from my childhood too. It's as if 8 and 48 year old me come together standing in front of these very different works of art.

The Cathedral is currently embarking on the next stage of its journey, starting with a major capital works programme of refurbishment. Perhaps I can share more stories of this wonderful building with you in future editions of Newstand Lite.
