In my more sane, less nervous times, I am interested in what we might be learning through this time. The media outlet Vox conducted a small survey of people around the world and of different ages about what changes they've made in lockdown that they would like to keep for the long run. Here are the **top eight lockdown habits** that people want to continue doing after lockdown:

- 1) By far the most popular response was reducing consumerism. This resonates with me. I look at all my stuff and think a) I don't need a lot of this and b) I need to stop bringing in new things. Some added that they target their shopping towards small, local businesses which have really struggled during this period.
- 2) Slowing down and putting less pressure on themselves. Maybe we don't need to be so busy. Having time to breathe, reflect and focus is a gift.

- 6) **Baking, vegetarian cooking and growing herbs**. My expanding waistline testifies to an increased interest in food.
- 7) **Spending more time in nature**. Yep.
- 8) Working from home if possible. I already mostly do this so I know the benefits and challenges. It's the reduced environmental impact that is the bonus now.

I can see the hand of God in these resolutions. Being connected to each other and to the natural world is part of God's design of an interconnected creation. Some of the unthinking habits that ruled our days before lockdown harmed ourselves, other people or the planet. The resolutions are also spiritual in that we will need help – from God and each other – to keep them. It is good to remember Paul's words: All things (even difficult things) work together for good for those who love God... (Romans 8:28). May it be so among us.


Opening for private prayer

Last weekend the Government announced that from 15th June churches could open for private prayer. As this was a suggestion that was 'sprung' upon us at short notice, the Revd Carla Grosch-Miller, Chris Hales, Bill Hopper and I held a discussion concerning the possibility of opening St Andrew's. Contrary to the picture painted in some sections of the media, it is not simply a case of opening the doors and letting people come in. To implement opening St Andrew's for private prayer, even for one person, would require a whole scheme of control being put in place including sanitising/cleaning procedures after each visitor. Whilst all the relevant equipment, sanitisers, PPE etc are on order, in anticipation of a possible opening for worship etc later this year, they will not be available until sometime in mid to late August at the earliest.

Whilst therefore being sympathetic to the suggestion that St Andrew's should open for private prayer, it was our view, endorsed by the Elders, that this was not practicable or possible at the present time.
