

# More ways to worship

Resuming some familiar services and other worship



September will herald the resumption of some more of the activities which had to be halted due to the pandemic.

On Monday the 5th, we shall be holding an afternoon service of seasonal hymns, readings and prayers, followed by refreshments. Designed originally for those people who for various reasons were unable to come to church on a Sunday morning, EVERYONE is welcome to attend. Lasting around half an hour, the service itself is shorter than our regular Sunday worship, and it's good to have another opportunity to chat over a cup of tea or coffee and biscuits or cakes afterwards.

From Tuesday the 6th onwards, our midweek Act of Worship, which takes place in the Church Foyer and consists of a brief informal service of prayers, readings and reflections, usually with one hymn, reverts from a Wednesday to its original day of Tuesday. It will be followed by the Open Door Coffee Morning, which will also be changing from a Wednesday back to its original days of Tuesday and Thursday.

On Sunday the 11th (and on the second Sunday of each month thereafter), we look forward to

welcoming back Mandy Watson, who will lead our Praise Service (now renamed 'Let's Sing') at 9.30 am, and Prayer Group meeting at 10.15 am. At around half an hour in duration, 'Let's Sing' features a range of more modern hymns and sonas, together with a less formal style of prayer. The members of the Prayer Group gather in the Meeting Room for approximately 15 - 20 minutes of prayer and reflection. There is plenty of space for more people to join in, either with 'Let's Sing' or the Prayer Group, so if you've never been before, why not give either 'Let's Sing' or the Prayer Group (or both) a try? You might find you like them, and you'll still be in time for Morning Worship at 11.00 am if you wish to attend that too!!

On Sunday the 25th we shall be celebrating Harvest, and again after a long interval (during which time they've been very much missed) we're hoping to welcome back the members of the Uniformed Organisations for a Parade Service. It's always good to have the young people among us again, and see their flags on display – a real breath of fresh air.
