And, of course, the greatest way the gap that stopped us from getting close to God was filled was through Christ's sacrifice on the cross and we will be eternally grateful to him for it.

Peace in the world

God's promise to us all



As we approach November, we hold in our thoughts Remembrance Day and Remembrance Sunday, to think back to the awful tragedies of WW1 and remember those who gave their lives for others, to bring peace. Only it wasn't the war to end all wars, another world war followed and wars between nations have continued ever since. More than ever this year, time now to think of peace in our sorrowful world.

As Christians, we often say the words: 'Peace be with you' -but what do we mean by the word peace? What does the word peace mean to you? Is it time for yourself, even a few moments? Time to be with family and friends? These are helpful ways to begin to think of the word peace... a time to feel that all is well, of contentment of being well, perhaps a time of wholeness.

But the word peace can relate to wider issues. The world, at this time in our history, is not at peace. The war between Ukraine and Russia comes first to our thoughts. However, there are other nations suffering through

war, famine and floods made worse through environmental damage caused by human activity through greed and injustice. The most fundamental elements of life, such as shelter, water and medicine are in so many countries simply not there.

But this is nothing new.

Turn back the pages of the Bible and in the Old Testament and the New Testament we can find story upon story of how the characters and the people of the nation of Israel struggled to find peace and the very basics of human life.

In the Book of Leviticus, we can find the story of how the people of Israel fled from captivity in Egypt and wandered for years to find a place where they could find peace, a place to settle and to be safe. In Leviticus 26: 3-6 the Lord promises all this... all the different aspects of being at peace and no one shall be afraid:

3'If you follow my decrees and are careful to obey my commands, 4I will send you rain in its season, and the ground will yield its crops and the trees their fruit. ⁵Your threshing will continue until grape harvest and the grape harvest will continue until planting, and you will eat all the food you want and live in safety in your land.

6'I will grant peace in the land, and you will lie down and no one will make you afraid. I will remove wild beasts from the land, and the sword will not pass through your country.' (NIV).

Peace, God promised 'peace in the land' and for all aspects of life for the people of Israel. Peace here is grounded in the relationship between God and the people of Israel, in the covenant relationship. This is a peace that is not dependent on an exchange between God and the people - of doing one thing in exchange for another but in

obedience to God, and it is the fruits of that relationship that create the environment for peace.

That message comes across to us today. How can we be at peace if our neighbours around the world are not? Peace has to be for everyone and that is through deepening our relationship with God; of the compassion and love for our global neighbours to make God's world a better place, a renewed earth, a renewed heaven on earth. In November, 'remembering' is a major presence in our thoughts and prayers and we remember in the presence of God for the coming of the Kingdom... for justice and for peace for all.

Recipe of the month

Zesty Turkey One Pan

Ingredients

- ½ tbsp olive oil
- 4 turkey breast steaks, total about 500a
- 12 fl oz chicken stock
- Zest and juice of 2 lemons
- 1 oz capers, rinsed and chopped
- 4 tomatoes, roughly chopped
- Large handful fresh curly parsley, roughly chopped



Method

Heat the olive oil in a large frying pan over high heat and add the turkey steaks. Fry for 2 minutes, turning once, to brown the steaks. Add the stock, lemon zest and juice, the capers, tomatoes and some seasoning. Simmer for 8 minutes until the turkey is cooked through. Add the parsley and check the seasoning. Serve with rice, seasonal vegetables or salad.

Remember, Remember...

The 3rd of November?

What has no heart, bones, eyes, or brain, is made up of 95% water, and yet is still a remarkably efficient ocean predator? Answer: the jellyfish.

While special days for raising awareness of the many serious issues facing the world — the climate, underprivileged people, the hungry, deprived children, homeless and those with physical and mental health problems, and so on — have an important role in changing the lives of millions of people, animals, and the world in which we live, there are some 'special' days that remain a mystery. Held on 3 November each year is probably the strangest ever, World Jellyfish Day.

No-one seems to know why it was started, or who started it. There does not seem to be any underlying commercial reason other than perhaps boosting the number of visitors to aquariums, and no-one knows what we are meant to do to celebrate it other than going to the seaside and trying to see one.

However, jellyfish have been around for between 500 million to 700 million years, they appeared on Earth more than 250 million years before the first dinosaurs, but because they are boneless, soft-bodied and almost all water, their fossils are extremely rare. While they are common throughout the world, and especially in the warm waters around the Middle East, they are not specifically mentioned in the Bible - but then few sea creatures are named in the Bible.

More than 2,000 different species have been identified and some scientists believe there could be as many as 300,000 more!

They come in many different sizes – some as large as 200 feet long – and they have an amazing variety of beautiful colours and shapes. Only a relatively small number of species, about 70, can be harmful to humans.

Perhaps the humble jellyfish is entitled to much more than one special day a year for us to ponder in awe on the amazing beauty and longevity of God's creativity.

Beauty in Sound

Tim and I regularly "tune in", so to speak, to a YouTube channel called "Beauty in Sound", which is run by an organist called Richard McVeigh. He has a regular live stream on Sunday evening from 8pm that includes hymns requested during the previous week and during the stream itself. It also includes a "my 5 favourite hymns" spot. I was lucky enough to have mine featured a few weeks ago.

I love a good tune, but when music and words combine perfectly, I get lost in prayer.... My choices, I think, reflect my faith based commitment to inclusion and social justice:

Number 5: The Kingdom of God (Tune: Out Skerries)

I realise that many will sing these words to another tune, but I think this one carries them so well.

Number 4: Beauty for Brokenness (Graham Kendrick)

A more modern worship song rather than a hymn and one I've always thought "not an organ piece" until I sat in our Cathedral and heard our Assistant Director of Music play it. It is the chorus that gets to me whenever I sing it "God of the poor, friend of the weak, give us compassion we pray..."

Number 3: Here in this place - Gather us In (Marty Haugen)

Again a more modern piece by an American hymn writer best known for the hymn "All are welcome". I love Marty's work and this one reminds me of a service



I jointly led for Northumberland Pride in 2019 in which I wrote and led a prayer of lament. Again, one line in particular brings it home to me - "Give us the courage to enter the song".

Number 2: How shall I sing that majesty (Coe Fen)

I remember the first time I sang this. It wasn't a special service or occasion but I remember thinking "Wow! What a tune!" That said, there's also a line in particular that stands out (there's definitely a theme developing in my choices here!). "Thou art a sea without a shore, a sun without a sphere". Such a vivid description of God.

Number 1: When I survey the wondrous Cross (Rockingham)

It's the last verse: "Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were a present far too small. Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all". For me, this hymn is the perfect example of a tune carrying words to perfection. The way it soars in just the right place hits me in the heart every time I hear it and I can't sing it without ending up with tears streaming down my face. I'm a fairly accepting and tolerant person (I think!) but singing these words to any other tune is unacceptable! If you have the access, please do check "Beauty in Sound" on YouTube as it is a
