Whitley Bay and District Churches Together

Updates from latest meeting



Hello folks, when you read this it'll be the New Year – so Happy New Year! I hope it will be a good one – 2023! And the restrictions, constraints and limits will be behind us!

Now I was going to ramble on about my life as an old 'un. However, as I attended a meeting of the Whitley Bay & District Churches Together the other night I thought I'd better write a report on it – it will be 'scintillating' reading, so perhaps I'll write to you another time!

The meeting was held at the Hillheads Community Church, which is right next to the Railway Pub! It's a lovely church – small and compact but they have strong ties with Marden Bridge Middle School. In fact they invite the pupils to visit regularly. On their last visit they were asked to design crosses! Well, you should have seen the diverse and really impressive interpretations of the CROSS!

But I digress – the opening devotions were led by Geoff Noble, leader at the church. He quoted from Paul's letters – reminding us as Christians we are needed more than ever in this troubled world to be active in our faith. 14 people attended, including Anglicans, Roman Catholics, Methodists, Baptists, URC and

Congregationalists as well as the smaller denominations.

One of the items was the possibility of producing Christmas Hampers organised by DePaul. We've supplied them with Pringles in the past. I hope we managed to send a few although it was late notice!

Another item on the agenda was providing Warm Spaces – 39 places volunteered, but at this stage the take up was low. Perhaps in January the numbers might increase. For those of you who don't know about this scheme – well, it's government sponsored and North Tyneside Council provide a grant if registered premises are opened up between 10 am – 4 pm, providing warmth, meals and company for anyone.

Next on the agenda – Parish Nurses – a group tending to the needs of people who fall beneath the radar of medical centres but NOT tending to medical needs, it's more about company and conversation.

We then had a short report from Street Pastors. I think we're all familiar with their work, only to say they're desperately short of volunteers. We were reminded they were awarded the Queen's Award for Volunteering – quite a prestigious award.

Next SWEP (Severe Weather Emergency Protocol) – kicks in from November until March – offering overnight food and accommodation for homeless people. This is based at Oxford Street Church. If you're interested in volunteering see the flier on the noticeboard in St Andrew's reception area.

Lastly a report about the Bay Food Bank – community supporting the community. Can I remind you there is a tub in the reception area if you would like to contribute. Can I just say "Thank you" to those of you who volunteer at the Food Bank but they will tell you goods are desperately needed!

Now, an important notice was given that Sue Austin is standing down as

the group's Treasurer. She assures me it is not an onerous job!?! So anyone, if you are interested please contact Valerie Taylor for more details.

The last item under Any Other Business

– the ecumenical gathering in

Monkseaton Village on Saturday 17th

December where mulled wine,

shortbread and mince pies were

served.

Sorry I've gone on a bit but isn't it good that ecumenically we do so much! Let us go into 2023 emphasising our similarities as Christians, rather than what divides us. God bless you!

Church Meeting

A précis of the meeting held 20 November 2022

Copies of the Minutes are displayed on the Notice Board in the vestibule of the Church. In case you were not able to be present here is a précis of the meeting.

Church Secretary reported:

Elders and Executive Team have met five times and Pastoral Team once since the June meeting.

- Measures for Covid prevention continued to be monitored to try and achieve some 'normality'.
- Support of all Worship Leaders much appreciated.
- New streaming equipment now installed – some 'tweaking' needed then training for volunteers to operate will be organised.
- Progress being achieved with improvement of lighting by installing LED units throughout the building.
- Renewal of some equipment required – due to non-use during lockdowns etc? Dishwasher, water boilers and coffee machine.
- Use of the premises increasing with more bookings of rooms.
- Activities Team pleased with number of social events especially the return of the Art Exhibition and



associated catering. Looking forward to the return of a more 'usual' Church Fair.

Treasurer reported:

- Finances fortunately the same as last few years.
- Gap still between Income and Expenditure.
- Early 2022 the budget was set at a time when the future was not looking good i.e. energy costs, reduced letting of the premises and limited social activity.
- Things have however turned out better. Activities Team have excelled and passed their target and the Church Fair was still to happen.
- Fortunately the Development Fund is available to fall back on and fill the gap.

The Meeting agreed that Sue Ames, Tim Cooke, Catriona Fenwick, Hazel Hall and Iain Ord be re-elected as Elders and also that Jenifer Fleetham be elected as an Elder for the first time.

The meeting accepted the recommendations of the Pastoral Call Group and the Elders' Meeting and invited Mrs Louise Sanders to 'Preach with a View'. Full details of the

programme for the 7th and 8th of January 2023 have been circulated to the congregations of St Andrew's and St Columba's.

The meeting agreed that in the event of Mrs Sanders being called to be minister at St Andrew's, and her accepting the call, Northern Synod be informed that the Beech Grove manse was no longer needed.

The meeting agreed revision of the Rolls in respect of people who no longer had an association with St Andrew's.

Date of next meeting: Sunday 19th March 2023 following morning worship.

58 Society reports

Ancient medicine and not so ancient Midwifery

14th October 2022 Doctor Peter Jones From Phlegm to Haemorrhoids – Ancient Greek Medicine

Peter gave us an intriguing talk on the development of Ancient Greek Medicine ably supported by Joan Blanchfield, who was co-opted just prior to his presentation, to read several unrehearsed synopses at various intervals during same. A brief report follows:-

Peter's presentation was a journey of the development of Ancient Greek Medicine by Hippocrates II of Kos born in 460.BC who is traditionally regarded as the father of medicine. He was the first known person to separate the discipline of medicine from religion, believing and arguing that disease was not a punishment inflicted by the gods but rather the product of environment factors, diet and living habits. The thought process of basic principles was described which included treatment followed by daily observation of the patient until improvement or death.

Although about 60 medical writing have survived that bear his name, Peter mentioned that most of them were not written by him. Hippocrates was revered for his ethical standards



in medical practice, mainly for the Hippocratic Oath which, it is suspected, he did not write. The medical theories developed by Hippocrates were mainly used by physicians for the next 2000 years.

It should be noted that to this day the Hippocratic Oath is still taken, although it has been modified to fit into the modern world, and newly graduated medical students have to take this oath. This oath is used as a general guideline in ethics in the medical domain.

22th October 2022 Una Ketteridge Call the Midwife

UNA gave us an interesting and informative talk on her training as a Midwife including services provided to mothers antenatal and after delivery of their babies. A brief report follows:-

Una related that from a very young age she always wanted to be a midwife although after she left school in 1951 with no formal qualifications she started work as a shop assistant. In 1954 however she was accepted on a 4 year course to train as a Midwife at Glasgow Royal Maternity hospital (Rotten Row). Working away from home in Glasgow for the first

time was quite an experience but she loved Glasgow and although the Gorbals district was notorious for the number of gangs she never felt threatened. The gang members respected the midwifes in uniform as they were aware that they worked in community supporting the poorest and unmarried women during pregnancy.

At the time of her training the hospital was the leading training centre in the country and she loved the stocking, skirt, blouse and bonnet type of hat, quite unlike today's midwives who are allowed to wear trousers. The training consisted of a 48 hour week with all lectures to be attended off duty.

The normal period in hospital at that time was 10 days for a normal delivery which is much longer than today. Una admitted that she almost fainted on her 1st delivery, but a woman giving birth was wonderful. During her training she was asked to sterilize teats

which at that time was carried out in boiling hot water but she let the water run dry and ruined the teats which resulted in telling off from Matron.

She also related a instant of a mother who was expecting quads after a 32 week pregnancy delivered 4 healthy babies who weighed in excess of 4 lbs. I believe the men and some of the ladies in the audience gasped at that fact.

In 1963 she transferred to the Princess Mary Maternity Hospital in Newcastle, had a break for her second child and then returned in 1970 as a Special Care Nurse until it closed down in 1993. She then transferred to the Royal Victoria Infirmary in Newcastle for 2 years until her retirement. Una's talk was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone and brought back pleasant memories of yesteryear for the majority of the audience.

So where did you go?

From the Light of the World to Clear White Light

Two members of St Andrew's went to the Sage Gateshead to hear a performance of The Messiah on Saturday evening 17th December 2022. The Messiah was composed by George Frideric Handel in 1741 and the music has become synonymous with Christmas and often performed by large scale orchestras and choirs. The text was compiled from the Kina James Version of the Bible and the Coverdale Psalter by Charles Jenners. Part I focuses on the prophecies of Isaiah and other prophets and in Part Il on the proclamation of the shepherds before concentrating on the Passion of Christ and the Halleluiah chorus. Part III covers the resurrection of the dead and the alorification of Christ in heaven. It is a beautiful towering piece of music of joyful hope.

Another member of St Andrew's attended a concert in Newcastle on 17th December 2022. Not a million miles from Gateshead but a completely different performance: Lindisfarne Christmas Concert in the City Hall. This too has become synonymous with Christmas in Newcastle.

Lindisfarne began as a folk-rock group in 1968 and has gone through many changes in the line-up of the



band. There is new material being written but much of the concert includes favourites of the Geordie band and their followers: Fog on the Tyne, Meet me on the Corner and Lady Eleanor with fans joining in the singing with great voices. Much of their music of the band is political, written in times of strikes during the 1970s and that continues today with their songs challenging the politics of today and the injustices that permeate our society. One piece of music always stands out to me, Clear White Light, the lighting in the hall at this point bathes the whole area in a clear white light.

The song was written by the late Alan Hull during his time as a psychiatric nurse, so this song is not written lightly or without deep thought.

The words are a million miles away from the words of The Messiah yet while the text of Clear White Light is not specifically religious or indeed referring to Christ as the light of the world, as Christians we understand what is meant by saying Jesus is the light of the world, and the words could perhaps reflect some of the actions of Christian folk: 'Now is the time to be loving and kind to your fellow men (and women); The clear white light is going to guide us on?'

Certainly, in the performance of The Messiah there are the stories of the Messiah drawn from the Bible and magnificent music with the Message. But I wonder, in the modern day, could Clear White Light be another way for folk, who have not met with Christ yet, to prompt them in their thinking -have their thoughts disturbed with the words of Clear White Light and bring the meaning of the love and action of Christ to unbelievers? We all come from different backgrounds and whether we listen and appreciate the magnificent words and music of The Messiah by Handel, or Lindisfarne Group each brings a message. The messages might seem a million miles from each other, but I wonder. The message is to all in the story of the Messiah and in Clear White Light a message to others, those for whom 'church' and 'faith' are not part of their lives, and those who others would see as being on the edges of our society. The Messiah has its great story, and on a much smaller scale Clear White Light could do the same? Wasn't that the mission of Christ...to bring everyone in
