The Struggle

Here's an update on Church matters in lieu of one



There was no Church Meeting in June! Sorry if you missed having a meeting but with all that was going on we decided to postpone holding a meeting until September when the next one is due and when Louise will be with us.

During the last couple of months we have been particularly involved with planning for Louise's Ministry. The discussions centred around the Terms of Settlement, the alterations to the Vestry to provide an office, the preparation of the service and financial discussions for Louise's occupation of St George's Manse. We are continuing to have to look after the Beech Grove Manse until it is sold.

At church we have had a Quinquennial Inspection, organised

and paid for by Northern Synod, resulting in a 57 page document which sets out a programme of work required to be undertaken - more of that later! Also we have continued with the replacement of light fittings with LED fittings to reduce our energy costs.

We have just received a letter from the solicitor acting for the late Miss Joan Hindmarch informing us that in her Will Joan left £1,000 to St Andrew's. Executive Team agreed that this be allocated to pay for the refurbishment of the servery (which should have been completed by the time you read this) as Joan was a great tea maker for the Ladies Guild and Wednesday Fellowship.

Journeying

Through the bible and our own church life

Genesis 12: 1,4-9

The Lord had said to Abram, "Go from your country, your people and your father's household to the land I will show you.... So Abram went, as the Lord had told him; and Lot went with him. Abram was seventy-five vears old when he set out from Harran. He took his wife Sarai, his nephew Lot, all the possessions they had accumulated and the people they had acquired in Harran. and they set out for the land of Canaan, and they arrived there. Abram travelled through the land as far as the site of the great tree of Moreh at Shechem. At that time the Canaanites were in the land. The Lord appeared to Abram and said, "To your offspring] I will give this land." So, he built an altar there to the Lord, who had appeared to him. From there he went on toward the hills east of Bethel and pitched his tent, with Bethel on the west and Ai on the east. There he built an altar to the Lord and called on the name of the Lord. Then Abram set out and continued toward the Negev. (NIV)

The Gospel of Luke 9:1-6

When Jesus had called the Twelve together, he gave them power and authority to drive out all demons and



to cure diseases, and he sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal the sick. He told them: "Take nothing for the journey—no staff, no bag, no bread, no money, no extra shirt. Whatever house you enter, stay there until you leave that town. If people do not welcome you, leave their town and shake the dust off your feet as a testimony against them." (NIV)

Stories of journeys in the Bible are plentiful. The people of faith have a long history of journeying and the Readings from Genesis and Luke are only two that give us a glimpse of the journeys undertaken in faith.

Journeying is part of the life of faith and belief in God.

Individually each of us are on a journey through our lives as Christians but corporately the church has also been on a journey to where churches are today, each denomination including the URC. On a train journey a few days ago I passed by Ely and the magnificent cathedral. I visited the cathedral a number of years ago while I was in that area as part of my studies, on my journey as a Lay Preacher. Inside the Lady Chapel tucked around the sides are small damaged statues and they have been left like that as a reminder of the

destruction by Henry VIII during the Reformation in Tudor England. This was a time of unprecedented change and a breakaway from authority of Roman Catholic Church.

The journeys of church and the people of faith would sometimes seem to have been disturbing times, revolutionary and chaotic. The emergence of a non-conformist denomination didn't have a straightforward journey either and came from a combination of theological ideas, political realities and personal spiritual journeys. Looking back in history names such as Luther, Calvin and Tynedale were all in that mix. Leaping forward Revd. Ian Paisley and MP Tony Benn were highly vocal in the political debates of the establishment of the URC prior to its establishment in the 1970s.

The journey of faith has from Abraham never been straightforward. But the journey goes on and change is inevitable and not always chaotic and traumatic. During the pandemic change to the way we worshipped was instant, but we coped in other

ways. There are always ways to continue the call to follow Christ and to be his hands and feet in the world. The call for God's kingdom here on earth remains. The church is alive with the grace of God, and the love and compassion of Christ remains steadfast no matter what happens around us. We as the people of the URC at St Andrew's have change coming soon, a new minister Louise, the first time in the history of this church that a woman minister has been called not to a church in chaos but people open to receive her, people who called her with joy. As we prepare for her Ordination and Induction we pray for Louise and each one of us joins with her, her husband Julian and their family on our iourney together with the living God and each of us will walk with Louise, a new joyous adventure with Holy wisdom on the next steps in all of our iourneys.

Archaeology and Creativity ...and the Bible?

Festival of British Archaeology 16-31 July

This year's Festival of Archaeology theme is 'Archaeology and Creativity'. It runs from 16-31 July and is organised by the Council for British Archaeology who describe the festival as incorporating 'hundreds of in-person and virtual events delivered by community groups, heritage organisations, universities, commercial units, and more in-person and online across the UK.'

Archaeology, say the organisers, is at its heart a creative process. It's about exploration and imagination; it's visual stimulation and inspiration; it's the process by which we create memory and meaning. By drawing on innovative technologies and using a wide range of tools archaeology helps us think about the world we live in. It is about storytelling and archaeologists use creative practices such as art, music, creative writing, poetry, and theatre to bring to life the material the archaeologists uncover, and the stories of the places and people around us.

Christians believe that the Bible, the oldest collection of historical writings known to exist, is the true history of God's Creation, so how do archaeologists view the Bible? Here are two quotes taken at random from https://infostudenti.net/en/hasnt-archaeology-disproved-the-bible/in response to the question: Hasn't archaeology disproved the Bible?

It may be stated categorically that no archaeological discovery has ever



controverted a Biblical reference. Scores of archaeological findings have been made which confirm in clear outline or exact detail historical statements in the Bible. And, by the same token, proper evaluation of Biblical description has often led to amazing discoveries.' – Dr Nelson Glueck, Rivers in the Desert, (New York: Farrar, Strous and Cudahy, 1959), 136.

'There can be no doubt that archaeology has confirmed the substantial historicity of Old Testament tradition.' – Dr. William F. Albright, Archaeology and the Religions of Israel. Johns Hopkins University Press, Baltimore, 1956, p. 176.

These quotes, and 10 others listed agree that the Bible is an accurate record of the many different historical events that have been recorded by both Old Testament and New Testament writers. Indeed, another quote by Sir William Ramsey says that in the Bible 'Luke is a historian of the first rank; not merely are his statements of facts trustworthy; he is possessed of the true historic sense...In short this author should be placed along with the very greatest of historians.'

Far from disproving the Bible, archaeological research seems to be strengthening the Christian message of God's love for us and the world he created.
