Praying for Peace

The events in the Middle East over the last two weeks have, understandably, shocked and saddened many of us. This is a part of the world where the locations seem so very familiar, we have read the place names regularly in the Bible.

The advice to the people in the North of the Gaza Strip to seek safety in the South has resulted in over 2 million people crammed into a space not quite 25 miles deep. This space has no water or electricity, food is running out and services already under pressure are literally breaking down. Lack of food and water means that many are returning to their homes in the North, even though their safety there cannot be guaranteed.

The resulting humanitarian costs and implications are enormous. The words of Pope Francis insightfully remind us that "terrorism and war do not lead to any solution, but only to death and suffering of so many innocent people".

How do we as Christians respond to what we see on the news, read in our newspapers and hear on the radio?

We could begin by acknowledging that those living in both Gaza and Israel are our brothers and sisters and therefore, deserve any help we can offer them. By agreeing to send financial aid from church funds and from our collections over the past weeks, we are helping in some way by supporting the work of the aid agencies working in the area.

We must also stop looking for a common enemy. We must acknowledge the need to reform our hearts before we can consider what is wrong in the hearts of others. In Luke's Gospel we read the warning, "Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye?" The message of the cross was never intended to change other people without first changing us.

And last but by no means least, we must pray. We must pray individually, from that place we find deep within us that cries out to a God who hears us and knows us. We must pray collectively, whenever we are gathered with others, uniting our prayers and taking comfort from the fact that God hears and answers our prayers. Let us not be afraid of silence in our praying, allowing God to enter into the longings of our hearts when even our words seem inadequate.

If you would like to join us, we meet on Zoom on Friday morning 10.30-11.30am.





Remember, remember the 30th of November

It's St. Andrew's Day!

The last day of the traditional Church liturgical year is set aside to give thanks for, and to celebrate, the life and work of St Andrew the Apostle who is recognised by many Biblical scholars as the first person Jesus chose to be one of his 12 apostles. He was born in Bethsaida. Galilee about 10 years after Jesus and we know from the New Testament that he was the vounger brother of Peter. The name. Andrew, is not Hebrew, as might have been expected, but Greek - the Greek culture was well known in Galilee. It means manly and brave, a characteristic that he portrayed when he was martyred for his faith in Christ around 60/70 AD.

It is said that he chose to be martyred on a cross like Jesus, although he asked to be bound to a saltire X-shaped cross as he was not worthy to die on the same shaped cross as Jesus, Today, the saltire cross is the national emblem for St Andrew in many countries where he is the patron saint including: Cyprus, Scotland, Greece (City of Patras), Romania, Russia, Ukraine, the Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople, San Andres Island (Colombia), Saint Andrew (Barbados) and Tenerife (Spain).



St Andrew's image is on many stained glass windows in churches around the world, including our own, and these often include a saltire cross as in the picture above.

In the 'top ten' names for UK churches today, 'Andrew' is the fifth most popular after Mary, All Saints, Peter and Michael.

There are several legends from around the world about where the relics of St Andrew are buried, including in Scotland. While it is highly possible that some relics of St Andrew are now buried in Scotland, exactly who brought them is not so clear.

Longest Night Service

A reflective service for those suffering from pain, loss or confusion at Christmas



Christmas time can be difficult when we have sadness in our life. We can feel disconnected from the joy and happiness of the festivities, or can have a sense of loss or emptiness. In a season of great joy, there seems to be little space for sadness and grief.

The Longest Night Service (also known as a "Blue Christmas" service) is an opportunity to come together in a simple, reflective service to remember those known to us who have died, and to recognise our sadness and our loss. Whether that be a recent bereavement – or one long past – we remember those dear to us and take time to be in God's presence in our vulnerability.

Our Longest Night Service, led by the Cooke family, takes place on Thursday, 21st December at 7pm, lasting about 30 minutes. The Church will be open for reflection from 6.30pm.

You are invited to send us any names you wish to be included (email, post, phone, or in person). These might be the names of those who have died, or the names of family, friends – or even ourselves – whose sadness we want to mark in this service. We will add them to the names on the roll that we have collected in previous years, so if you have previously had names included be assured they still will be (and if for any reason you would like a name removed, please let us know that too).

The service is open to all, so please do ask friends and neighbours who might be interested in being involved – either by submitting a name, or by being present.

Snippets from Synod

A report on the latest meeting 14th October 2023



Synod meetings are held in March and October of each year. This is when all the committees in Synod give their reports and resolutions are made. The meetings are open to everyone (a good way of meeting people and finding out what goes on), but I attended as St Andrew's Representative.

A full report would take too many pages and too much time, so here are a few snippets from the meeting: The meeting took place at Stockton Rd. URC in Sunderland and was chaired by Revd. Kim Plumpton, our new Synod Moderator.

The theme for the day was "Flourishing-Local Churches"

The meeting began with worship, led by Lucy Cooke, in the absence of Revd Jane Rowell, Stockton Rd's Minister.

The Northern Province Trust manages the Synod's Finances, Properties and Human Resources. An appeal was put out for new people to join the committee, particularly females, as they are under-represented. Can you help?

A report was given regarding the budget, accounts, various grants and legacies, including one from the estate of Dorothy Postle. It was proposed (and resolved) to increase the fee to visiting preachers to £40 plus expenses.

News of people and places was shared, including the ordination and induction of our own minister, Revd Louise Sanders. Carla was also mentioned as she approaches retirement and thanks were given to the many lay preachers who work hard across the Synod.

Two new Safeguarding Officers have been appointed to the Northern and Yorkshire Synod safeguarding Team, which is being supervised by Matt Knowles. In future, our initial point of contact within the Synod Team is Helen Berg,

There is a vacancy for a Commitment for Life Advocate for Synod.

Seven members of Synod have made a successful visit to Greenbelt.

Revd. Julian Sanders, as the newly appointed Convenor of the Children, Youth and Families Committee, gave an update on the current Strategy and Hannah Middleton (Children's Work Advisor) and John Stephenson (Youth Work advisor) talked about the work they had undertaken over the summer months. Following on from General Assembly this year, the

committee is exploring how we can help churches to include Children and Young people in their decision-making. Churches were also encouraged to consider working towards the Children and Youth Friendly Church Scheme, even if they currently have no or few children or young people in the congregation, as it may prove attractive to younger people. This tied in with the theme of "Flourishing-Local-Churches. An Advent resource based on Posada was launched.

Two presentations were given on how the church is reaching out to the community in different ways...Roker Life and Wooler Warm Hub.

We are all urged to work towards the Eco Church Award.

There was more and I am happy to talk to anyone who is interested. A full report will be available before the next meeting, which will be held in March. I would also be happy to take anyone who is interested along with me.

Likely commitment at Trinity Ashington equates to 25% or one day a week and leading worship on the second Sunday of the month.

Candidacy for Ministry

The meeting fully agreed with the recommendation of the Elders to support Dr Ann Sinclair to train as a non-stipendiary minister.

Date of next meeting: Sunday 26th November 2023 following morning worship.
