Musing from the Manse

"The unconscious imagination is the fount of true perception"



George MacDonald was a fantasy writer and a Congregational minister in the 19th Century. He was a prolific writer and C.S. Lewis says of him, "I regard George MacDonald as my master, indeed, I fancy I have never written a book in which I did not quote from him".

MacDonald saw the imagination as a place where we encountered God, and that through images and symbols God reaches out to us. And he is not the only writer, or painter, or musician to use their imagination to reveal something special in the things that often pass us by without us noticing.

"And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours'." (Luke 2:13-14)

When I read the Christmas story, I see very much the writer's imagination at work. That's not a bad thing and I am not saying that the story is not true. But in the telling of this story, the writer has looked beyond the ordinary to reveal something special; to reveal a place where God reaches out to us.

Secular society tends to disregard the Christmas story as a fairy tale, partly because it is not historically or scientifically verifiable. But I think they miss the point that that may not have

been the intention of the writer to begin with. If a historically and scientifically accurate account had been made, then the dry old text may have been consigned to the annals of history and certainly would not be brought to life again every Christmas.

William Blake described himself as having double vision, by which he not only saw things, but looked beyond them to the invisible world behind them. This is what I believe the writers of the gospels do when they tell the Christmas story, and I also believe it's what we do as Christians.

As Christians we celebrate the incarnation. God breaks into our world. He is here all around us, we need only to have eyes to see. The apostle Paul writes:

"We look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal". (2 Cor 4:18)

"We walk by faith, not by sight". (2 Cor 5:7)

Let us celebrate the Christmas story again this year as we rediscover the truth that lies within it. And may we all in faith, look through the tinsel and glitter of Christmas to the God who reaches out to us beyond it.

Longest Night Service

A reflective service for those suffering from pain, loss or confusion at Christmas



Christmas time can be difficult when we have sadness in our life. We can feel disconnected from the joy and happiness of the festivities, or can have a sense of loss or emptiness. In a season of great joy, there seems to be little space for sadness and grief.

The Longest Night Service (also known as a "Blue Christmas" service) is an opportunity to come together in a simple, reflective service to remember those known to us who have died, and to recognise our sadness and our loss. Whether that be a recent bereavement – or one long past – we remember those dear to us and take time to be in God's presence in our vulnerability.

Our Longest Night Service, led by the Cooke family, takes place on Thursday, 21st December at 7pm, lasting about 30 minutes. The Church will be open for reflection from 6.30pm.

You are invited to send us any names you wish to be included (email, post, phone, or in person). These might be the names of those who have died, or the names of family, friends – or even ourselves – whose sadness we want to mark in this service. We will add them to the names on the roll that we have collected in previous years, so if you have previously had names included be assured they still will be (and if for any reason you would like a name removed, please let us know that too).

The service is open to all, so please do ask friends and neighbours who might be interested in being involved – either by submitting a name, or by being present.
