'Accidental Theme?'



Last night I had an email from Tim "have I forgotten that it's Newstand this
week and am I working on this month's
'Musings'"? Basically, yes I had
forgotten and no I am not working on
anything! But I do have a good excuse
– I am currently sitting in the 'Vinery' at
the Hayes Christian Conference Centre
in Swanwick, attending my first
Ministers' May School with
approximately 35 other ministers from
across 3 different synods, as well as
various speakers and 3 Training and
Development Officers.

We have been engaging with a theme of 'Challenging Church, Challenging Context' and considering the various issues that face the churches today, but also some of the challenges for congregations as they seek to engage with the diverse range of people they may come into contact with.

I am always on the look out at these kind of gatherings for what I call an 'accidental theme'. Something which the organisers may not have planned, that the speakers haven't been in 'cahoots' about, but which have arisen anyway, I believe, because of the nudging of the Holy Spirit.

I was delighted when it happened today - especially as it instantly gave me an idea for this 'Musings'! Now I've peaked your interest, I'll tell you in what it was.

In our first session, Victoria led a session asking where the church is when it comes to having a voice in the public square, and speaking into the issues that are affecting our society, and she drew attention to a verse from 1 Peter 3:15 – "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have."

Later in the afternoon, Glynn then led a session inviting us to consider how we reach the 'nones' (those with no concept of faith or of a God who loves them), and he gave us examples of work he is doing with groups of people across the country, and again he quoted 1 Peter 3:15. And the best part? He wasn't in Victoria's session and didn't know she had quoted that same verse!

For me this all comes down to witness. How good are we at answering someone if they ask us where our hope comes from? Are we able to articulate it and speak from the heart about a God who has an everlasting love for each and every one of us, regardless of age, gender, class, race or sexual orientation - or any of the other differences we use to divide us?

I'm going to leave you to ponder this one because Lucy has just told me it's dinner time!

Flight

A daily reflection from Swallow's Nest by Tom Gordon



"Ours is the commencement of a flying age, and I am happy to have popped into existence at a period so interesting."

Amelia Earhart, 20 Hrs, 40 min (1928)
There are many representations of the Holy Spirit, the story of Pentecost in The Acts of the Apostles giving us the "rushing, mighty wind" and the "tongues of fire", for example.

However, the traditional symbol for the Holy Spirit has been the dove, pictured in paintings, stained-glass and sculptures through the centuries, including the simple but powerful depiction of the descending dove carved into one of the pillars in Iona Abbev's cloisters. And isn't the peaceful beauty of the descending dove so appropriate, from the dove with its olive branch returning to Noah to indicate that the flood had ended and a new world could beain, to the "Spirit of God descending like a dove" as Matthew describes Jesus' baptism in the Jordan by John? But through the years of the Iona Community, another symbolic representation of the Holy Spirit has been emphasised - the wild goose in flight. Reputed to be a Celtic understanding of the Spirit of God, here is a new, and different,

interpretation of the Spirit – movement, togetherness, newness, restlessness, migration, leadership, shared responsibilities, community, and much more besides. Here is the Spirit of God calling us out and up, to move and be changed, not always to be static and safe.

I suspect the disciples of old would have felt blessed by the Spirit of God on Pentecost – safe, rested, comforted, at one with each other. But they were also called to be apostles – to move into mission, to fly the nest, to trust God in the journey to newness, to get up and travel on.

On the day following Pentecost, let's remember that in the dove of blessing and wild goose of challenge, in safety and movement, in stability and restlessness, being established and creative, the Spirit of God will not be confined. And if that Spirit is the wild goose for us, might we feel, like Amelia Earhart, that we are at "the commencement of a flying age" and be "happy to have popped into existence at a period so interesting" for us?

A prayer for today

Lord, when I am at rest, give me blessings. When I am in flight, lead me on. Amen

Thoughts for the 80th anniversary



It's a human frailty that we remember some things more clearly than others. In WWII I'd guess that the campaigns which stick out in the memory are Dunkirk, The Battle of Britain, the Dambusters Raid and D-Day. It may be because they were short, well defined, clear actions rather than the protracted slog of war in other theatres.

This month it's the 80th Anniversary of D-Day which captures the attention with commemorations across Britain and France.

But as we remember with pride and gratitude all those service men of Britain, the Commonwealth, the United States and the many other nations who took part in the D-Day Landings in Normandy, 6th June 1944, spare a thought and prayer for those who were elsewhere, where fighting was just as fierce but less well remembered:

The Battle of the Atlantic was still raging and was as dangerous as ever

The Bombing Campaign over Germany still continued to exact a tremendous price on bomber crews,

The Artic Convoys were paused for the summer but would resume.

The "forgotten army" were still fighting in the Burma Campaign, and

The "D-Day Dodgers" who had fought up the length of Italy, captured Rome on 4th June, and were even then fighting on into Northern Italy.

So, remember and give thanks for all the service men and women who fought for justice, freedom and peace.

And, in all these commemorations, let's not forget the fallen, those who never knew whether their sacrifice was in vain:

Went the day well? We died and never knew. But, well or ill, Freedom, we died for you.

John Maxwell Edmonds, 1918

Edmonds is credited with authorship of the famous epitaph in the War Cemetery in Kohima which commemorates the fallen of the Battle of Kohima in April 1944:

When you go home, tell them of us and say For your tomorrow, we gave our today.
