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Musing from the Manse

Christ - The Light That Overcomes the Darkness

I wonder if you have a favourite season of the year? I think mine is probably autumn. Sometimes in the summer I feel pressure to make the most of any nice weather we have, and when the weather isn't glorious there's a disappointment that we're not having the summer we feel we should be having. The autumn however, can surprise with gloriously sunny days and if it's not great then I can 'hunker down' indoors and enjoy just the release from all the frantic activity of the summer.

Now, as autumn settles in, the days grow shorter, and the nights grow longer. The vibrant colours of the trees are just beginning to reveal their splendour, and the early sunsets leave us in darkness for much of the evening. It's a time that can feel quiet and introspective, even a bit gloomy. Yet, this season offers a powerful reminder of a profound truth: Jesus has overcome the darkness.

In John 1:5, we read, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." The Concert Band proved popular when they entertained us last July and there were requests to see them again. Tickets at £10 are now available.


Play Reading Evening Saturday 26th October, 7 pm

Précis of meeting held 15 September 2024

Copies of the Minutes are displayed on the Notice Board in the vestibule of the Church. In case you were not able to be present here is a précis of the meeting.

 Attendance: 50 members, 3 others. Apologies for absence: 9.

Church Secretary reported:

- There had been a Special Church Meeting in June regarding the repointing of the church building plus Meetings of the Elders, Executive Team, Pastoral Team and Worship Group.
- Routine servicing and maintenance undertaken including annual testing of portable appliances and fire equipment. Proposed to reexamine fire stewarding arrangements and training.
- Activities Team pleased with support, from church and community, for social events organised. Looking forward to forthcoming Art Exhibition and Church Fair and other events such as Coffee Morning for Macmillan Cancer Care organised by Una.



- The Quakers are inviting St Andrew's folk to Afternoon Tea as a 'Thank You' on Saturday 12th October.
- Premises continue to be well used and facilities offered appreciated by users.
- Regular services continue to be well attended – work put in by minister and others much appreciated.
- Future services include joint service with St Columba's on Sunday 6th October.
- Development Fund used to: 1)
 cover the general deficit, 2) the
 proposed building repair work, 3)
 cover running costs of newly
 appointed Pioneer Youth Worker
 and 4) a proposed Baby &
 Toddler Group.
- Sale of Beech Grove Manse completed.
- Grateful thanks to all who contribute, in whatever way, to enabling St Andrew's to continue to be a presence in this area.

Treasurer reported:

- A general explanation of the funding arrangements.
- Continuing to overspend each month as expected and shown in the budget.
- Income has been above budget and expenditure round about what was expected.
- Development Fund continues to be used to fill the gap, £18,000 so far this year.
- Development Fund increased by rise in value of investments with Northern Synod.
- Continuing Manse expenses now in respect of our contribution to \$t George's Manse.
- No 'black holes' reassuring to know that we can continue with day-to-day church life.

Minister reported:

- On her pleasure at the support for the Evening Service.
- Songs & Stories explained in detail the proposed new Baby and Toddler project.
- Proposal to hold a Christingle Service on Wednesday 11th December.
- On the Community Carol Service being held on Monday 16th December.

New Members:

 Agreed that Mike and Linda Short, and Hazel Howlitson be welcomed into membership.

Date of next meeting: Sunday 17th November 2024 in the Main Hall following morning worship and during coffee.

Up and down a mountain or 3 for a bit of a ding-dong

Another "postcard from the edge"



When Andrew and his fellow Cambridge University Bell Ringers, Jad and Andrew, came up with the crazy idea of climbing the three Yorkshire Peaks of Pen-y-Gent, Ingleborough and Whernside in one day that was strange enough. When they also decided to ring a peal on hand bells at the top of each one too it got even more unusual (a peal being at least 5000 changes in the order the bells are rung taking around 90 minutes). The whole idea nearly got shelved when they couldn't sort out accommodation, but we came to the rescue by deciding to have our summer holiday in the Yorkshire Dales, and just booking a slightly larger cottage so Jadd and other Andrew would have somewhere to sleep for a couple of nights.

Their expedition started early, leaving the cottage at 5.30am to drive to Horton in Ribblesdale. A relatively short walk and climb to the top of Penn-y-gent for the first peal saw them attacked by a swarm of midges that were particularly attracted to our Andrew. That led to them curtailing the full peals to just quarters (1250 or more changes), which turned out to be the right decision.

They succeeded in making it to the top of Ingleborough and Whernside

and completing quarter peals there too, with less midges this time, although the wind was rather strong at the top of Whernside causing them to shelter behind a convenient wall to ring. As dusk fell they made their way back to the car, arriving just before 10pm, and then the hour long drive back to the cottage.

After 24 miles on a hot sunny day they were all exhausted and a bit sunburnt, but pleased with what was a unique achievement amongst bell ringers.

Tell out my soul

A lifetime's dedication to hymns of God's glory

A well-known name in our hymn books, Bishop Timothy Dudley-Smith died earlier this year on 12th August 2024, at the age of 97. He wrote more than 400 much loved hymns enjoyed in Christian worship, including, "Tell Out, My Soul" and "Lord for the Years".

It was over 60 years ago that he began writing poems, but did not believe they would become hymns because, as he said, "I lacked all musical ability". (A lesson in itself!). However, he went on to author metrical settings of psalms and scriptures, Christmas carols and many texts on Christian discipleship. He said that a good hymn must adhere to divine truth and to Christian



experience, adding, "It is the hymn writer's privilege to offer worshippers the words in which to clothe and express the aspirations and emotions of the heart".

Rev'd Timothy was born in Manchester. After graduating in maths and then theology at Cambridge, he prepared for ministry in the C of E's Ridley Hall. Ordained in 1950, he ministered in Kent, Bermondsey and Norwich, becoming Bishop of Thetford in 1981. At a birthday celebration he commented, "Hymn writing has been for me a most enriching and entirely unexpected gift".


