


Stewarding at St. Andrew's

Do you know your Rejoice and Sing from your Pounds and Pence?

In the early part of 2026 we shall be seeking additional people to join the Stewarding rota.

Many of our current Stewards have served faithfully and diligently for a number of years, and the contribution they have made to the life of St Andrew's has been invaluable. However, for reasons such as ill-health, advancing age and election to the Eldership, we now need to recruit some replacements, and I would ask that you give the matter careful consideration to see if you can help.

Stewards are the people who give out the hymnbooks on a Sunday morning, greeting you with a smile and a cheerful "Good morning". They are also responsible for bringing forward the offering at the appropriate time, and after the service is finished they



help the Church Treasurer to count and record the Gift Aid offerings. None of this work is onerous, but it is important. The Stewards work in pairs, and they are normally on duty each Sunday for one month in the year, although they can be asked to help out on other occasions if, for example, a Steward is unable through illness or for some other reason to fulfil his/her own duty.

For people who have started coming to St Andrew's more recently, being a Steward is a good way to get to know other people. Alternatively, people who have been a Steward or a Serving Elder in the past, might feel they could take up a Stewarding role once more. If so, please do get in touch with me.

On 2nd December, 1697, Sir Christopher Wren's St Paul's Cathedral opened in London.

The original cathedral had been severely damaged during the Great Fire of London in 1666. While some repairs had taken place and services continued in the ruins, it became clear in 1668, when the nave collapsed, that a permanent solution was necessary. Construction of the new cathedral took 33 years and spanned the reigns of five different monarchs.

Church Meeting report

Précis of meeting held 22 November 2025



Copies of the Minutes are displayed on the Notice Board in the vestibule of the Church. In case you were not able to be present here is a précis of the meeting.

- Attendance: 46 members.
Apologies for absence: 14.

Church Secretary reported:

- Few meetings held since the last church meeting in September and this meeting was early in the month due to other Sunday commitments.
- Routine servicing and maintenance continued.
- Renewal of defibrillator required. New unit to be re-sited outside between ramp and old church doors as a community unit. 7th Brownies had suggested the change and would support the unit. Development Fund will underwrite the cost, around £2,500.
- Fire precautions signage required updating as well as control panel to be re-sited near main entrance. Revision of Evacuation Policy to be undertaken.
- Elders and Pastoral Visitors continue with their pastoral

oversight.

- Awaiting outcome of Special General Assembly Meeting.
- Regular plan of worship continuing.
- Continuing to work towards Louise taking up ministry at St Columba's on 1st January 2026. Induction Service on 28th February 2026
- Grateful thanks to all who contribute, in whatever way, to enabling St Andrew's to continue to be a presence in this area.
- 6th Monkseaton Guide Unit have announced the formation of a new Ranger Unit. Expressed appreciation of support given to them by St Andrew's.
- Amber Greenhalgh thanked the church for the support given to her to undertake her guiding trip to Canada. Amber helps at two Brownie Units, the Rainbow Unit and is a founder member of the new Ranger Unit.

Treasurer reported:

- Income and expenditure continues to be fairly close to budget.
- After 10 months, deficit of around

£7,000. Proceeds of Church Fair will reduce this but year will still end with a deficit.

- Development Fund dropped with the major spend on re-pointing and re-roofing – but that is what it is for. Plenty still available for other projects.

Minister reported:

- Her appreciation at the manner in which the discussion meeting and vote on St Andrew's holding Same Sex Marriages was undertaken.
- Songs and Stories Toddler group continuing to be very popular
- Success of the Light Party on Halloween when over 100 people

visited the table outside the church for food, drinks and literature which was displayed. Appreciated by the local community.

ELECTION OF ELDERS

Carole Moore, Sandra Pine and Celia Purves were elected to serve as Elders for five years. They will be ordained and inducted at a service early in 2026.

Christmas Islands

A tale of two places with 10,000km between them



There are two Christmas Islands in the world. The first is a dot in the Indian Ocean and even though it is in Australian territory, its closest neighbour is Java, 360km away. It comprises the summit of an oceanic mountain, rising to 36m above sea level and predominantly covered by tropical rainforest.

British and Dutch navigators first included the island on their charts in the early seventeenth century and Captain William Mynors named the island when he arrived on Christmas Day in 1643, although he was unable to land. In 1688, when Captain William Dampier landed at the Dales (on the West Coast), two of his crew became the first recorded people to set foot on Christmas Island. Christmas Island was not settled until 1888, when the Clunies-Ross brothers from the neighbouring Cocos-Keeling Islands (some 900km to the south-west) established a settlement at Flying Fish Cove to collect timber supplies. The British Admiralty annexed the island on 6 June 1888, and phosphate extraction became the impetus behind the island's development.

Today the recoverable reserves of phosphate are nearly exhausted, and during the 1990's a shift in economy began to take place whereby other

industries such as tourism edged their way in. A more recent population survey showed fewer than 2,000 inhabitants, only one third of whom are female. Almost three quarters of the population are from Chinese origins, but all are Australian citizens and the Australian schooling system prevails. An interesting place indeed.

The other Christmas Island is one of the many islands in the Republic of Kiribati. Part of the Line Island Group, it is the largest coral atoll in the world with an area of 248 square miles. Its population is mainly Micronesian from the I-Kiribati archipelago, with a small group of Polynesians from Tuvalu and some expatriates. From the time of the Cold War, Christmas Island will be remembered for the nuclear bomb tests that took place off its coast. Britain's first nuclear test explosion at Christmas Island took place on 15 May 1957, and in November 1957 there were two further H-bomb explosions.

Christmas Island is at the forefront of the news today as those who served there are still fighting for compensation for the terrible consequences of the experiments for their health and the health of their offspring.

The saga of a smoking uplighter

Whilst we're thinking about fire...

It was a beautiful start to the Remembrance service, uniforms and flags parading in, all looking very smart, red faces and runny noses from the fresh cold air outside. Wardens and sidespeople alert to their duties. Everyone sat down and ready to remember with respect and reverence.

Suddenly the two Wardens looked at each other! That noise, what on earth was it? Could it be snoring this early in the service, surely not. Not today and before the sermon as well. No, not snoring, more like a buzzing.

A hearing aid malfunction? No, it seemed to be moving. Yes that's it, it's moving, flying, and there it was - a big bumble bee. What to do, the Wardens' team thought (together by thought transference). "Glad it's not me," the retired Church Wardens thought.

Adopting a well tried and often employed technique, the Wardens' team decided individually and collectively to wait and do nothing. Lo and behold the buzzing stopped. Prevarication triumphs again.

Much, much later a worried worshipper caught the attention of a Warden downstairs. "Smoke from that

light" was the terse message. On the way to switch it off there was an impromptu Wardens' meeting at the foot of the gallery stairs and a similar message was exchanged from upstairs. Both up-lighters were duly switched off. No ceremony, no announcement and more importantly no fire and no panic.

Much later, on the following Wednesday, the offending up-lighter was carefully examined by the Wardens in the presence of the Lay Reader and Honorary Assistant Priest (Retired). The moral of the story, and there is at least one, is if you see something out of the ordinary during a service, tell a Warden. Shouting out "FIRE!!!" is to be reserved for only the most extreme and immediate danger.
